The daily reality of the elderly people is dominated by having to consider every lei they spend, as their pensions have hardly been adjusted to inflation since 1989. They long for the old days when you were at least sure of having a daily bread, although it meant queuing for hours.

But now the European Union comes along. What consequences will that have? Will the people of Vatra Dornei finally know prosperity and well being? Most of them think with the EU all problems will resolve in thin air, but they often don't realize that they will still have to work to achieve any improvements, according to Adrian Ardelean. Other aspects of accession to the EU are also important, he says, like a rich cultural heritage that Romania can offer Europe, poetry, music and folklore, that always have belonged to Europe.
